A year of renewal, revival, and yet, challenges

his year marked our third year of life and ministry since the 2020 global, COVID-19 pandemic. For our 73 churches, it was a year that pushed us to seek greater clarity and purpose. We sought God in prayer and discernment for direction and creativity. We learned new lessons about stewardship, whether from abundance or from struggle. We walked by faith and not by the familiar. At moments of exhaustion, we dug deep and cried out to the Lord.

God invited us into His work, and we preached and lived out the good news of Christ boldly. We served our communities generously. We found new ways to gather and experienced the relief of less Zoom meetings and more connectedness. We got first-row seats to inspiring baptisms and confirmations. We experienced renewal and revival.

With our loaves and fishes, we gave all we had to God and He multiplied it. We witnessed His amazing activity and miracles. We continued to live into our collective vision to be a mosaic of churches working interdependently together to transform lives and communities.

Challenging year

Like many of our churches, the conference saw a 12 percent downturn in shared mission giving. Though multi-factorial, this decrease was mostly due to lower attendance and individual church income.

Yet despite this, God provided

for the conference in amazing ways. Grace Community of Olympia gave \$55,000 above and beyond their normal mission giving to the conference. This was from the \$225,000 they raised for their 50th anniversary celebration to support different mission partnerships. We also used the remaining funds from the \$103,000 memorial gift from the estate of Robert and Shirley Lindberg (Highland Covenant) that we reported last year. Those helped with church outreach grants, supporting pastors and funding our Mosaic Coordinator position.

We also received \$107,000 from individual donors, \$100,000 of which was a special year-end gift designed toward youth ministries, leadership development, and capacity building with our Spanish- and Chinese-speaking ministries.

There is a level of relief with all of the above, but also ongoing concern. The conference Executive Board will take 1-2 years to determine if more significant adjustments are necessary. In the end, we keep our faith in our Jehovah Jireh.

We struggled this year with

issues around our theology of marriage and sexual ethics. This was most prominently represented in Quest Church being recommended by the Covenant Executive Board to be involuntarily removed as a member church. This came after processes that I and our conference Executive Board walked through with Quest.

The conference Ministerial Association leadership and conference staff co-hosted a gathering to begin to address growing tensions within the denomination concerning the removal of pastors and churches. President Tammy Swanson-Dra-

heim participated in person and shared her thoughts and plans to help move us toward a more constructive overall posture. She identified the need to de-escalate matters to build greater trust and unity in order to move forward.

As this developed, many churches held exploratory gatherings and preparatory meetings for the involuntary removal votes that will be taken at "Gather 23" June 28-July 1 in Garden Grove, California.

It was also an impactful year with five churches that experienced transitions.

Seventy-four year old Evergreen (Mercer Island) merged with Encounter, Bellevue (2022), our newest member church. Bread and Wine Covenant Church (2021) merged with First Covenant of Portland. Disciple Community, Bellevue (2013) and Grace, Bremerton (1943) concluded their ministries. Hope, Everett (2011) is currently taking final steps to transfer to the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America denomination and sell their building and move to Lake Stevens.

There were also major denominational leadership transitions with our election of President Tammy Swanson-Draheim and executive ministers for Serve Globally, Grace Shim and Develop Leaders, Herb Frost. We also anticipate work on a denominational realignment

that will address current financial limitations.

I am reminded that with all change comes a sense of loss, and with all loss comes shades of grief. There were many changes last year and we know there will be more changes ahead. Through the losses and the grief, we continue to count on our Unchanging One, our Dependable One, our Rock.

We had many celebrations and joy throughout this year in our shared ministry. I invite you to give God thanks for all the wonderful fruit that's captured in this report.

To begin, let me prime the pump a bit and share a few things from our three mission priorities:

SUPPORTING PASTORS

Six pastors finalized their ordinations: Scott Burnett, Newport; Rachel Gough, Monroe; Shaun Higgins, Midway; Leslie McAuley, Immanuel; Kristi Smith, Milwaukie and

Sharad Yadav. Portland First. With half of our ordinands women, and our first female president, it adds to the celebration of Rev. Ieisha Hawley's call to Arlington United and Rev. Jeannette Conver to Clear Lake Community.

This now makes 10


women lead pastors in eight churches. About 27 percent of our total conference ministerium are women. We have much work to do to nurture and unleash all called and gifted people.

We also supported ministers by offering sabbatical grants and scholarships for Midwinter and Cascades Camp. We provided coaching, spiritual direction, retreats, cohorts, piloted a lead pastor's spouse group, and came along pastors in crisis.

STARTING CHURCHES

You will read about our five current church plants and how exciting it's been to see these young churches grow. At this time, we have only one potential new planter in the queue.

We need to think differently and more creatively as we begin new projects. My hope is to see church planters doing residencies in our current churches and launch new churches more organically and locally.

"Build it and they will come" strategies are becoming increasingly less effective. We are no longer looking to parachute-drop planters into areas. Instead, we are coming alongside pastors with established relationships and presence in a community. We are not committing to any financials until planters are able to gather a significant core group and raise enough money. We desire to find planters that are primarily looking for an organizational covering and accountability. We are looking to see if the planter fits the Covenant and desires to be actively and deeply connected.

Once there is evidence of these things and fruitfulness over time, we then come alongside and provide funding. We need your support and prayers for this important area of ministry we do together.

STRENGTHENING CHURCHES

We resourced several staff searches, including nine lead pastor transitions: Arlington, Bethany, Clear Lake, Emerald City, Kent, Milwaukie, Selah, Valley and Wiley Heights. We saw several churches access new resources from the Covenant's vitality resources, most notably with the new congregational assessment tool Periodic Health Check (pH√).

Other churches have called conference staff to coach, troubleshoot challenges, mediate problems and do trainings. Developing mission clarity has never been more important.

Our children and youth continue to be one of our most

fruitful areas of work together. Because of this, we invest heavily in it. The "Thunder" and "MUD" retreat numbers grew closer to pre-pandemic levels. We joined together

with the Alaska and Pacific Southwest Conferences to host more than 900 students and leaders at Unite West. Decisions have been made to do three regional Unites instead of a single triennial one. Leaders are already preparing for Unite West 2024.

We continued to encourage greater understanding and awareness around the application of Biblical justice. We hosted "Lunch and Learns," where experts and practitioners shared wisdom and challenges. We had to cancel last year's Journey to Mosaic, but plan to bring it back this year. We also saw many attend Radiant's inaugural annual Faith and Race Conference. In all of this, I want to encourage us to be proactive, life-long learners.

We continue to work closely with the Camp during this very active and successful rebuilding year. There are exciting new projects we are in the middle of, including a new adventure park to replace the old Rubicon area. What we love most is the consistent reports of so many

young people choosing Jesus at camp. Camp is sacred ground – that which is set apart for a special and holy purpose. I am ever grateful for the excellent leadership of Executive Director Rob Mohrweis and the entire team. They served us and their community in Yelm admirably and excellently throughout this year.

We worked hard at keeping you informed and connected to the wider conference and denomination. We utilized our social media channels (Facebook, Instagram, YouTube) as well as our monthly e-newsletter The Catch and its companion The Catch of

the Week (please subscribe).

As we came together around these three mission priorities, I want to especially thank the conference team. Cris, Dawn, Erik and Peter are such a joy to serve with. They do so faithfully and excellently and continue to be key influencers in their respective areas in the denomination. I am especially thankful to our Executive Board as they provided vital oversight and accountability for all of what we stewarded together. I also am grateful for all of you who served on denominational and conference commissions, boards and associations. Where we would

be without all you who said yes to places of leadership in your churches? Indeed, we are better together.

It is fitting that as we celebrate 133 years of mission friendship, we do so in Spokane. Within the first few years of my tenure in our conference, we closed Minnehaha Covenant and First Covenant Spokane, who were struggling. FCCS walked a long road to re-envision themselves into The Gathering House, a cafe, community hub and church. We adopted City Cov and Immanuel, who in turn launched The Garden. I thought we were going to lose our presence in Spokane, but today we now have these four churches with the sense that God has much more for us in the Lilac City.

Our experiences in Spokane serve us well. Among the incredible highs and painful lows, we can be confident that God is present and active. God is working in Spokane, and he is working right where you are.

Mission Friends, keep fasting and praying and worshipping our great God. Keep serving your communities extravagantly and commit yourselves to the long work of making disciples. As you continue to lean in and follow Jesus, may God continue to fill you with His grace and love. May you know His deep joy and peace.

Lord, you are [our] God; [we] will exalt you and praise your name, for in perfect faithfulness you have done wonderful things, things planned long ago.

EMPOWERING THE PEOPLE

Equipping lay leaders to do the Kingdom work

s our conference mission statement states, we are a mosaic of churches working interdependently together to transform lives and communities.

We wholeheartedly agree, and are passionate about the local church – God's chosen vehicle for the whole Gospel to be heard and experienced. Therefore, we seek to provide every opportunity to strengthen the leadership and membership of our local churches, and fan the flame of inspiration as the Holy Spirit leads our churches into its discerned Kingdom work.

This year, strengthening local congregations included lay leader trainings and connections for church chairs and other elected officers. In June, 23 leaders representing eight churches, attended the "ECC Church Chair Training" at Harbor Covenant.

Afterward, one participant commented, "I had no idea there was so many resources available to us. This was eye opening and needed." Another said, "The conference was wonderful, the presenters were thoughtful and concise, and the topics that were covered were extremely useful." We look forward to the next ECC sponsored training, June 3

at Newport Covenant Church.

In addition, I offered two "Church Chair orientations" over Zoom in the fall and winter. These are opportunities to provide best practices regarding leadership team roles and responsibilities; annual rhythm for leadership team work; how to best care for your pastor and staff; and a Q&A. Especially valuable is the conversation and connection that occurs between the church chairs, as they

learn from one another. For that reason, I continue to offer bi-monthly "Church Chair Connections" as well, where we share and address current realities in our churches and encourage one another.

Many of our local churches have engaged the new assessment tool called "pH√" offered through the ECC's mission priority, Start and Strengthen Churches. This online survey provides a real-time snapshot of how your congregation scores in a variety of categories, such as missional identity, vision, and leadership. To date, seven conference churches have participated in the survey, are processing their results and establishing priorities based on the outcomes. This "periodic health check-up" is intended to be taken on a regular basis to establish a baseline and guide conversation as the leadership and congregation discerns areas of needed health and growth.

This year, we witnessed great efforts by our local churches to lean into this postpandemic season and renew their efforts in engaging their local communities.

Here are some examples:

Milwaukie Covenant

Milwaukie, Oregon

This fall, Milwaukie CC re-engaged connection with the school next door through the "Backpack Buddies" program at Linwood Elementary School. Through a grant from the Lindberg Family Memorial Fund, along with the generous participation of the congregation, MCC was able to provide 75 students on the free-and reduced-lunch program with two meals to take home each weekend.

McMinnville Covenant

McMinnville, Oregon

There is burgeoning interest in the

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history and participation of Asian-Americans in Yamhill County, and McMinnville Covenant Church is getting involved. The newly formed Asian Heritage Association launched its first public event: a Lunar New Year Celebration. A dumpling-making team from the church helped produce 500 dumplings for the event.

Pastor Ted Yuen said: "For a small community that has an Asian population of less than 2 percent, this was a landmark event that connected the Asian community with the entire community. There was a sense of joy and celebration throughout the day. It felt like shalom."

Radiant Covenant

Renton, Washington

In February, Radiant Covenant hosted their first Faith and Race Conference. The purpose was to examine "the intersection of our faith in Jesus Christ and the system of race which impacts each of us." The theme of this year's conference was "Intersections: The Church, the Community, and Culture."

With more than 90 participants and presenters from local churches, schools and the denomination, Radiant CC is looking forward to making this an annual event.

Currently, most of the participants do not attend church, or have any church background. Pastor Bob Do reports that the common response that many people have is that they like "the vibe" of our open gyms, which has been welcoming and inviting.

He adds: "We have been able to invite a few people to come to some Table events as a result of our friendships."

The growth of the coaching industry (e.g., I coached 440 hours in 2020 and 547 in 2021) reflects the larger shifts that our culture – and therefore our churches (and church planting) – have been experiencing.

Just as the Spirit is always moving the church towards the priesthood of all believers and the equipping of the saints for the work of the ministry, the same Spirit is moving humanity towards a flatter, more relational, more humble leadership style.

And as it turns out, coaching embodies this lower power-differential, co-leadership approach. We all need leadership and loving contradiction in our lives. It's the coach's ability to fit into a modern person's self-curated portfolio of resources and support structures, the coach's method of coming alongside rather than over or under, and the agency-supportive

I would love to see our churches embrace the coaching leadership style as a part of their overall shifts in church culture and methodologies.

Healthy clergy = healthy church

Pastoral care continues to be a high priority for conference leaders

highlight of my work – and I believe I can speak for the staff team – is the opportunity to offer care, consultation, and coaching to our clergy. I count them as colleagues and friends. Over the years, in these reports, I have emphasized the importance of clergy health and well-being and how that relates to the health and wellbeing of the local church where they serve. I trust that message doesn't need repeating. In fact, I'm encouraged by what I'm hearing from colleagues and church leaders regarding those efforts of care and increased access for sabbatical and renewal leaves.

Recently, I had the opportunity to facilitate an orientation for a newly formed "Mutual Ministry Team" at

one of our conference churches. There, I presented material on why and how to care for their ministry staff. New to this presentation is the post-COVID survey results from the Barna Group, reporting that 42 percent of pastors have thought about quitting in the last few

years. And, anecdotally, what conferences are reporting across the ECC is the challenge pastoral search teams are having in finding candidates for open positions. It is amazingly low and slow! Therefore, all the more reason to encourage, care for, and seek the health of the pastors and pastor families you already have.

Here are some of the ways that the conference invests in our clergy:

Clergy clusters

The conference is divided into 11 geographic "districts." Of those 11 districts, we currently have seven active clusters gathering on a monthly basis, whether in-person or virtually. Further, we have an active multi-ethnic pastors' group in Oregon that meets several times a year.

Cohorts

North Park Seminary administers a grant from the Lily Foundation for the purpose of supporting and encouraging female clergy in the beginning years of pastoral ministry. I have been leading one of these "Thriving Vocationally" cohorts this year with five of our conference pastors, meeting monthly for encouragement and support and quarterly for a day retreat together.

In addition, the ECC's mission priority "Develop Leaders" also supports a wide variety of online cohort opportunities, two of which were initiated and led by our own clergy: "Healthy Leaders Develop Healthy Churches" with Rev. Mark Knight and

"Preaching Camp for Women" with Rev. Jane Spriggs.

Retreats

A variety of retreats are held throughout the year to encourage renewal and connection. The PacNWC Ministerial Association, with support from the conference staff team, hosted the annual fall (newly renamed) Ministry Families Retreat at Cascades Camp and Conference Center in October. While overall registration was smaller than in the past, it served as a great restart after COVID, with an increased number of children and spouses attending.

A first this year was an in-person, combined "Clergy Women Retreat" and "Exploring Call Retreat for Women" held in November at Dumas Bay Centre in Federal Way, Washington. There was a total attendance of 24, which included 12 women there to discern call, four facilitators, and eight clergy women coming for retreat. Designed as two separate retreats, yet with crossover connections in worship and meals, it was the mutual assessment of the group to continue combining the

A year of connectedness, renewing relationships



Spiritual direction

In partnership with the Ministerial Association, the conference continues to support the PacNWC Spiritual Directors Network, which provides 10 sessions of free spiritual direction for clergy and spouses. This past year, 13 directors were serving approximately 20 ministers or spouses.

Town Hall

In response to questions, concerns, and an open letter written about the ECC Executive Board's announcement to bring two Covenant Churches for vote for involuntary removal at 2023 Annual Meeting in June, including one in the PacNWC, the Ministerial

Association and conference team hosted a Town Hall gathering in January at Kent Covenant Church. More than 100 ordained and licensed conference clergy attended in person and online to hear from Superintendent Greg Yee and PacNWC Executive Board Chair and Covenant pastor Jim Sequeira about the process with Quest Church.

In addition, President Tammy Swanson-Dreheim prioritized this meeting and presented her current thinking on the "position, process, policy, and posture" in the ECC with regard to human sexuality. The response to the gathering and the table conversations was positive and the intention is for the Ministerial Association to continue gathering conference clergy for similar "Town Hall" conversations several times a year.

first year to have two MUD retreats – one in February, and the other in November.






